OVERVIEW

The Sisters of Charity arrived in Baldoyle in July 1869, to begin their dedicated and caring work in the community. St. Mary's Secondary School opened its doors in September 1967 with an enrolment of 50 girls. In 1972 the secondary school moved to its present premises and began to enrol students from all over North Dublin. Extensive renovation and building work followed and today's school offers all the latest facilities and opportunities to its students. The school will be accepting first year boys in 2024.

TRANSITION YEAR



In addition to core modules, students also get to take part in various modules including Public Relations, Hairdressing, Film Studies, Dance, Baking, Cultural Studies, Self Defence, Mini-company, Log-on Learning, Junior Achievement, School Bank, Gaisce – The President's Award (including optional adventure trip), Educational tours

Students also take part in a two week work experience programme which takes place near the end of the first term.
